Medicine in School


I would like to remind all parents and carers that children are not allowed to bring any form of medication into school (no matter how seemingly benign) to self-administer. This includes cough lozenges, painkilling medication (such as Fast-Melts) and lip balms etcetera. For health and safety reasons, school must be made aware of any medication that children require as there is always the possibility that medication could be taken in error or, indeed taken by the wrong child. I would remind parents that school is under no legal obligation to administer any medication and we will only administer, as a gesture of goodwill, medication which is prescribed by a doctor to be taken four times a day. Please note that school will, on occasion and where there is sufficient medical advice to do so, administer paracetamol but we can never administer Ibuprofen. Thank you for your support with this matter.

Sickness/Vomiting

I would like to make parents and carers aware that, on the advice of the Prince Regent Street Trust, we no longer require your child to stay away from school for a period of 48 hours after a last bout of vomiting. The Trust has advised school that unless the child has gastroenteritis, 24 hours is a sufficient amount of time to stay off school after a final episode of vomiting. I am aware that the local policy of 48 hours has been challenged in the past, including by some members of the medical profession, seemingly because vomiting due to a virus appears to be most contagious prior to and not after vomiting. From Monday, the office staff have been told to inform parents and carers that children can return to school after a 24-hour period.

World Book Day

Also, if they wish, children can bring in any books to swap

with one another. Please ensure that your child has your consent to bring in any books from home to swap.
